

A MOMENT IN TIME


A grand Federation home is thoughtfully modernised, accommodating historical character features and the owners' extensive art collection with aplomb.

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t's befitting that an art-collecting couple bought the former home of one of Australia's foremost artists, Ray Crooke. "He painted all the glass lintels with his art, but the next owner moved in and scrapped them!" says owner Jane, who considers herself merely a caretaker of this Federation-era house on Sydney's Lower North Shore. "These old houses are not really ours - we're just custodians of them for the next generation," she says. "So there's a responsibility to respect the history and original workmanship, while modernising it for today's needs."

Determined not to butcher any more historical features, Jane and her husband engaged architect Adam Hampton and heritage consultant Lucy Hampton to future proof this characterful home in a compassionate way.

The couple bought the corner-block property in 2014 when their twins, now 21, were in their final year of primary school. "We did a quick repaint and recarpet, updated the bathrooms and rewired everything – the lights were still operated via pull strings," says Jane. "The next year, we renovated the pool area." A large-scale reno kicked off after the twins finished their HSC.

Adam and Lucy of Hampton Architecture were tasked with creating "classic and grown-up" spaces that would showcase the family's art. Their long-time collaborator, Alex Dimitriadis of Revolution Building & Construction, did the heavy lifting.

Also on the couple's wish list: a new second storey in the generous roof – comprising two children's rooms, a master suite, a main bathroom and a home office. Amazingly, every room in the former roof space boasts a window or a skylight. >

"It's surprising how much height and volume is upstairs," says Adam. "There are views across to the city, good light and ventilation. The clients were excited because they didn't know what the view was going to be until we got into the roof space."


On the ground floor, off the home's welcoming foyer, two downstairs bedrooms and a bathroom were bestowed their own arched 'entrance', offering a tad more privacy and delineating them from the entertaining zones. The existing cramped rear kitchen/living/dining addition was overhauled. It now flows from the main hallway and features a new scullery, laundry, powder room and library niche. Steel-framed glazed sliding doors open onto a refreshed entertaining patio.

While some architects err toward the bold or contemporary when crafting new additions, Adam made the first floor almost indiscernible from the street, since it sits within the original terracotta-tiled roof. In the new kitchen/living/dining, decorative features, such as cornices and skirting boards, have been carried through from the more traditional rooms at the front of the house. Clean lines and an achromatic palette in the kitchen ensure the aesthetic doesn't tip into twee reproduction territory.

The previously "beige" interiors were elevated with swathes of Porter's Paints Snow Patrol, a delicate grey, contrasted with vivid white trims in Porter's Paints Alpen. "This makes those period elements pop out," notes Lucy. The neutral scheme allows the family's art collection to shine, which includes works by Bulthirrirri Wunungmurra, James Needham and heirloom pieces from Europe. Adding more gravitas are herringbone floors and darker cossetted spaces, such as the library niche and the powder room. "My husband's family has a long history of book publishing," explains Jane, "so Adam designed a library behind steel doors in the family living room."

Now the house is finished to their taste with plenty of room for multigenerational living — one child lives interstate; one lives at home — Jane and her husband are likely to stay here for 20 years. Give or take. "The original impetus for the renovation was so my mother-in-law could move into the front bedroom as there's level access," explains Jane. "But she's fiercely independent so I'm not sure that's on the cards anytime soon!"
